

CALL FOR INNOVATIVE TEACHING INITIATIVES























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Introduction

ERUA brings together 8 European universities: European University of Viadrina (Germany), New Bulgarian University (Bulgaria), Paris 8 University (France), SWPS University (Poland), University of Las Palmas de Gran Canaria (Spain), University of Macerata (Italy), University of Mykolas Romeris (Lithuania) and University of the Aegean (Greece). Our consortium is co-funded by the European Commission under the Erasmus+ EUI call for projects.

Our mission is to address the actual world challenges by bringing together students and academics from different parts of Europe and from all socio-economic backgrounds to contribute to the transformation into a more just, open and inclusive society.

To operate such changes, ERUA promotes the development and the delivery of innovative academic initiatives such as travelling seminars, intensive modules and summer/winter schools, etc. This call for projects for innovative teaching activities has the ambition to be one of our most innovative forms of learning. It is intended for initiatives that will take place during the 2025–2026 academic year.

Recognition of ERUA activities for students

Upon completion of the ERUA initiative, a certificate of participation will be issued. This certificate includes a short description of the course, the form of participation and, if applicable, the result obtained and the number of ECTS. Additionally, it may also include the learning outcomes, the acquired skills and the EQF Level. The certificates are developed in accordance with the European Commission's recommendations on microcredentials.

Given that the universities within the Alliance adhere to their respective national frameworks, they follow different practices and conditions regarding the recognition of ERUA activities at the national level. Therefore, we strongly recommend reaching out to your home university for further guidance.























1. Select a Topic

It is important to choose a topic that not only appeals to students from your university and the partner universities but also aligns with the values and objectives of ERUA. The topic should be related to one of the following thematic areas:

- Migration, exile and refugees
- Environmental transition
- Democracy & human rights, inclusion & gender equality
- Arts and edges
- Interculturality and multilingualism

Please, note that it is essential to provide a comprehensive description of the knowledge, skills, and competences that students will bring to your initiative, as well as those that you aim to develop through their participation. This thorough detailing aligns with the ERUA philosophy of fostering a rich educational experience and ensuring meaningful engagement.

2. Find a Project Partner

One of the first steps in developing an ERUA project is to identify one or more partners. First of all, you can explore the websites of the ERUA universities to see the courses and disciplines they offer. Here are the links to the university websites:

You may also reach out to the ERUA team at your home university, who can assist you in your search. Additionally, attending and participating in various ERUA activities can provide opportunities to connect with potential partners.























The <u>ERUA research portal</u> is also a great way to connect with other researchers. It allows you to find collaborators within partner universities and register your profile so that other researchers can find you. Please note that not all eight ERUA universities have professors actively present in the portal yet, as the process of completing institutional profiles is still ongoing. If you need further assistance, feel free to contact the ERUA staff—see the annexe at the end of this document for all relevant contact details.

3. Select the Type of Initiative

We are developing different types of teaching initiatives: travelling seminars, semester courses, and summer/winter schools and intensive courses. Below, you will find the specific features of each initiative, which should be taken into account when preparing your project. An annexed document will also assist you by providing examples of initiatives that took place in previous periods, helping you better understand the types of activities supported and developed within the ERUA framework.

Choose the type of activity you plan to develop:

Travelling seminar

Travelling seminar is a training programme based on the mobility of one teacher and their students to another ERUA university for a joint project embedded in the standard or elective offer.

In addition, this format allows student involvement in co-designing innovative pedagogical approaches and experiencing civic engagement.

Objectives & priorities

The ERUA "Travelling Seminars" can be held throughout the year. Each university will select several projects annually, with each project comprising a group of students and teaching staff. Our goal is to provide as many students as possible with the opportunity to participate in this initiative each year.

The idea behind travelling seminars is to strengthen connections between the universities within the alliance and to promote projects that involve various forms of collaboration (such as co-teaching, campus visits, field studies, etc.) and to develop the project-based mobilities.























Eligibility criteria

This call is open to academics from our 8 universities who wish to design one project-based course in accordance with their ambitions, ideas and the flagship pedagogical and research areas of member universities.

The travelling seminars are short-term mobilities hosted by one of the partner universities. In other cases, they should include at least a co-teaching arrangement or any other configuration that brings together students and/or teaching staff from at least two member universities.

Travelling seminars can cover any topic relevant to ERUA's objectives, enhancing the internationalisation profile of yourself, your students, your home university, and the host university.

After each travelling seminar, a survey is submitted to students and teaching staff, and a final initiative report, written by the teaching staff, is required to demonstrate the pedagogical impact of the seminar, gather feedback, and keep a record of the experience. The report is written after the teaching staff has received and reviewed the students' feedback analysis, in order to ensure that it reflects both the pedagogical design and the actual student experience.

As an alliance, we need to collect as much feedback as possible to track ongoing initiatives and continuously improve the program.

Selection criteria

Projects will be approved by both the sending and receiving universities based on their perceived innovation and interest. In the framework of a traditional travelling seminar, a professor first submits a project to their home university and seeks support from a counterpart at the host university. The Work Package 2 leaders should be informed about the initiative and may provide recommendations for enhancing the travelling seminars. If the project is approved by the professor's home university, the host university must be contacted as soon as possible by the administrative staff of the organizing university, in coordination with the academic team of the host institution. During these phases, coordination and communication are crucial.

Projects that include co-teaching sessions or university visits are especially encouraged.

Selection will be based on the following criteria:

- Relevance to ERUA's objectives and mission
- Innovative aspects of the project
- Quality of the project structure and organisation
- Expected impact on participants
- Expected learning outcomes

Travelling seminars will be assessed internally by the universities implementing them, taking into account the shared eligible criteria defined by ERUA Alliance.























Budget

ERUA funding covers the mobility costs of participating students, including travel and accommodation according to each university's internal rules. Some ERUA Alliance Universities can fund teaching staff's mobility through the ERUA budget, while other Universities fund the teaching staff's mobility through Erasmus+ Office (as Erasmus+ KA131 STA/STT visits).

Intensive, semester courses and summer/winter schools

ERUA courses are open to all ERUA students and can take various forms: intensive modules, summer/winter schools or semester courses. These courses enable students to enhance their study programs at their home university by enrolling in courses available at other ERUA universities. Additionally, ERUA courses allow students to explore new academic disciplines and provide an international experience whether through going abroad or staying at home.

ERUA teaching staff can host ERUA students in their courses through two options:

- Open a few places for ERUA students in existing courses
- Develop new courses specifically created for ERUA students

Teachers should specify the prerequisites (such as level and field of study) and the number of places available for ERUA students.

Intensive modules cover a significant amount of material in a shortened period of time (usually from 2 days to 1 week) delivering the same amount of content that a traditional course would cover over a full term. These immersive courses enable students to complete a subject quickly. Most ERUA intensive courses are conducted onsite.

Summer or winter schools are academic programs held during the respective break periods, which differ among ERUA universities. These programs typically last from one to two weeks onsite, offering courses across various disciplines. They provide students with the opportunity to take additional courses and delve deeper into a main subject by studying it from different perspectives,























fostering interdisciplinarity. In this context, it is expected that partner universities contribute substantially to the programme, for example through the provision of guest lectures by their academic staff.

Semester courses are standard academic courses offerings that span an entire semester, with classes meeting regularly one or twice a week. They allow for a more gradual and comprehensive study of the subject providing time for in-depth study, projects, and assessments. Within the ERUA framework, Semester courses are offered primarily online, but they can also be blended, combining online lessons with an on-site component—for example, five days of in-person classes.

Selection criteria

Each university will select projects they find most innovative and compelling. The ERUA Selection Committee for Teaching Initiatives will provide final approval for intensive modules, summer and winter schools and other projects available to all ERUA community, ensuring the quality of the proposed initiatives and their alignment with ERUA's core values and objectives, while fostering a shared vision across the alliance.

Projects will be evaluated based on the following criteria:

- Alignment with ERUA's objectives and mission
- Innovation within the project
- Quality of the project's structure and organisation
- Expected impact on participants
- Expected learning outcomes

Budget
